

## Pastor's Reflection

The subject turned to the Death Penalty the other night at Wednesday At the First. The United Methodist Church in its Social Principles takes a firm stand against Capital Punishment. I fully support that stance and once participated in a march against the use of the Death Penalty in South Carolina.

Just because I am ordained does not mean I must support the official stance. I am free to disagree with it, as are all United Methodists. But for reasons which are moral, religious, and practical I oppose putting people to death, no matter the seriousness of their crime.

Our discussion was lively and somewhat heated, but not enough for anyone to feel disregarded. No one else spoke up in support of my opinion, so it appears that I was the lone opponent of Capital Punishment in the room.

I was proud of the group. Why? It's because our discussion was so real yet respectful. Like so many subjects, feelings were strong on this one. But no one accused me of being stupid or uncaring. There was no name -calling of those with the minority opinion.

We had real dialogue the other night in the fellowship hall. I hope that our church will continue to set an example in our community. It is possible to have honest, respectful conversation and debate on our country's most divisive issues.

## From the Director of Music

Being a child of parents who came of age during the 70 's, I could not escape the influences of music of the 70 's and 80 's. Easy listening music helps us relax and raises our spirits. Love, sex, promiscuity is nothing new to popular music; its history can be traced to the wondering minstrels of the medieval period. Those love songs found their ways into the sung liturgy of the church. L'homme Armee, or the armed man, was a controversial form that was used for several centuries in church Since words were written and sung in Latin, and the majority of persons in this era were illiterate, no one but the priest knew what was being done. For one, I have an affinity with the music of the 70's, as personal expression seemed to be at its height in this era. One of the Carolina groups that I most enjoy is the Catalinas. It gets you right in the mood to be happy and enjoy life.

Enjoying music perplexed St. Augustine, as if it were sinful to enjoy something that intended to praise God. We can enjoy music and worship God at the same time. I joked with some friends of mine that "How Great Thou Art" should be retired with the death of George Beverly Shea. While this hymn has reached the hearts of many of persons, it is like the "Star Spangled Banner." Every person has his or her own interpretation of it, or believes that we should sing it like

Shea. Too often, we fail to realize that recordings and radio versions have been "doctored" to sound perfect. Sing and make a joyful noise, and don't care about what you neighbor thinks. Your neighbor won't be judging you when you get to heaven.

I will be teaching a series of classes this summer. One is entitled "The Voice of the Congregation", and the other will be on the Music and the Hymns of the Wesleys. I intend to start this class on Wednesday, June 5, 2013. Books for this study are approximately $\$ 10$.

Also on June 3, 2013, I intend to a start a summer community choir; not to take the place of the community choir already in place, but to offer a place for those who like to sing to come together. The rehearsal will be from 6:30 pm-8:00 pm .

To sing in this group, an audition is required. The sole purpose of this audition is to place individuals in the correct voice section.
