PARSON TO PERSON

John Maxwell, founder of INJOY, is someone I respect because he has a heart for motivating churches and people to be the very best they can be. I am on the mailing list and keep up with his books and his writings, particularly when it comes to stewardship information. Recently, he has written an article entitled The Keys to Victory. His words point to victorious results and a winning campaign for any church's effort.

He writes at the beginning words attributed to Vince Lombardi: Winning isn't everything. It's the only thing. John Maxwell then goes on to write: Those seven words...spoken by Vince Lombardi...have become the mantra for countless teams in virtually every sport. They adorn posters, plaques, Post-it notes and T-shirts. They are quoted innumerable times in locker rooms across America. But Vince Lombardi wanted to take back what he said. Shortly before his death in 1970, Lombardi told famed columnist Jerry Izenberg. "I wish I'd never said that. I meant the effort. I meant having a goal. I sure didn't mean for people to crush human values and morality." As a leader and strategist, Lombardi had few equals, and his words carried such weight that their impact had gotten beyond his control. Asked how he would re-state his words, he replied, "I would say: Winning isn't everything, but wanting to win is." He knew what matters is the desire, not the conquest. Vince Lombardi understood the priority of pursuing victory in the right way with the right motives.

Winning is something most everyone wants to do. From college athletics to the business world to the church...people desire to be victorious. People work toward winning and employ their best strategies that will bring about that end. During Lent, we are reminded by Jesus that in God's Kingdom the key to winning is in losing. Our goal must be to surrender ("lose") our lives in faith in order to establish ("win") the Kingdom's presence and truth in our community.

Jesus had a way of helping lives to be turned upside-down. "The poor shall be rich." "The meek shall inherit the earth." "Save your life and lose it. Lose your life for the sake of the Gospel and win.'

I believe Jesus said these types of things to keep us dependent on his wisdom. Too often we think about life in terms of winning and losing. This happens because we know how we want things done or how we want situations to work out. Jesus turns the world upside-down by reminding us that we must trust God in our life moments. His hand leads and guides the faithful in positive ways. Life is about trust. Circumstances often challenge our trust. May we live in such a way that we always seek where God is leading us.

P.S. When Jesus entered the city, there were cries of "Hosanna." The same people in a few days would shout "crucify him." Where had they placed their trust? Ken Timmerman

Palm Sunday: A day we remember and relive as "Hosanna" filled the air and shouts of "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord" resounded in the streets of Jerusalem. What begins in triumph and celebration turns to sorrow as Jesus is tried and sentenced to die on the cross. He speaks the truth that comes from God, but it challenges too many, and they determine to rid themselves of his teaching and preaching. He meets in an Upper Room with his disciples on Thursday evening and shares a final meal (Holy Communion). From there things moved quickly to prayer in the garden, to being betrayed, and tried in an illegal trail. This week begins Holy Week. It is a time for prayer and self-reflection. It is also a time of gratitude as God offers us the gift of salvation and the opportunity to be in relationship with him.
