Why We Do What We Do...

As most of you know, Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sunday, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday.

The Great Three Days — sometimes called the Triduum or Pasch—from sunset Holy Thursday through sunset Easter Day are the climax of Lent (and of the whole Christian year) and a bridge into the Easter season. These days claim the paschal mystery of Jesus Christ's passion, death, and resurrection. During these days, the community journeys with Jesus from the upper room, to the cross, to the tomb, and to the garden. These events should be seen as one great unified service beginning with a service of Holy Communion on Holy Thursday and concluding with the services of Easter Day. These services might even be connected with a prayer vigil lasting from Holy Thursday evening (or Good Friday) until the first service of Easter.

In recognition of The Great Three Days, you are invited to worship at First UMC all three of these days!

On Thursday, April 18th, beginning at 6:30pm, we will have a Maundy Thursday worship gathering in which we will celebrate Holy Communion.

On Friday, April 19th, beginning at noon and carrying over until 3:15pm, we will have a Good Friday Service of Prayer and Liturgy. At the top of each hour, noon, 1pm, 2pm, and 3pm—scripture will be read, along with a brief narrative. The remainder of each hour—45 minutes, approximately, will be set aside for silent prayer. You are invited to come to this service at an interval of your

choosing, just please be sure to be seated in silence at the top of any given hour—noon—3pm. Most certainly, you are also invited to attend for the entire duration: Noon until 3:15pm.

On Easter Sunday, we will celebrate the Day of Resurrection first, with a Sunrise Service at 7am on the front steps of the sanctuary. Then, at 11am, please join us inside the sanctuary for our Resurrection worship celebration, complete with a Cantata by our Chancel Choir!

Hope to see you amidst all of these opportunities as we celebrate Holy Week 2019, together.

What Happened at Special General Conference, 2019?

The Called Special Session of General Conference took place on February 23-26, 2019 in St. Louis, MO. The purpose of the gathering was to consider plans developed by the church's Commission on the Way Forward and designed to help the denomination move ahead in unity despite theological differences regarding human sexuality.

General Conference delegates passed the Traditional Plan 438 to 384 on Day 4 of Special General Conference 2019. This means current statements about homosexuality in the United Methodist Church's 2016 Book of Discipline have essentially not changed. The Traditional Plan retains restrictions against "self-avowed, practicing homosexual" clergy and against officiating at or hosting same sex marriage ceremonies. It also requires stricter enforcement for violations of church law.

However, delegates requested that the UMC's top court, the Judicial Council, review the constitutionality, meaning, application and affect of the Traditional Plan. The court agreed to review this at it's next scheduled meeting, April 23-25 in Evanston, IL. It has ruled twice earlier that parts of the Traditional Plan were unconstitutional. Much of the unconstitutionality has to do with matters of due process, as well as elevating requirements about homosexuality above other matters. Up in the air is how much of the legislation will take effect or what happens when people or Conferences defy the rules. If the Court allows, the Traditional Plan legislation would take effect January 1, 2020 in the United States and 12 months after the 2020 General Conference for the rest of the world.

General Conference also approved an exit plan, called a "disaffiliation plan," for any churches that want to leave the denomination with their property. However, that plan, too, is awaiting Judicial Council review when the court meets in late April. The exit plan specifies that churches that elect to leave must pay unpaid apportionments and pension liabilities.

General Conference also passed petitions requiring churches that leave to pay their share of unfunded pension liability for their annual conference. Clergy members who end their relationship with a conference will be treated as "terminated vested" participants; their benefits would be safe and con-

verted to an individual account balance. The pension legislation took effect immediately.

General Conference did not pass the One Church Plan, which was the plan supported by the Council of Bishops and which would have left questions of marriages up to churches and clergy, and ordination requirements up to conferences.

Finally, General Conference organizers have named a twelve member task force to investigate after General Conference 2019 Secretary the Rev. Gary W. Graves revealed, March 14th, that there were potential voting irregularities at the Special Session. Specifically, Graves said a limited number of people who were correctly denied delegate credentials were later able to procure them. Graves said General Conference organizers do not know if the possible ineligible voters supported a particular outcome, as voting is by secret ballot so all delegates can vote their own conscience. South Carolina Bishop L. Jonathan Holston released a statement March 15th calling for a time for calm and patience instead of reacting immediately to this sort of news.

General Conference 2019 had the same delegates as General Conference 2016 unless Annual Conferences chose to elect new delegates. There were 864 delegates, but 31 were absent, mostly because they could not obtain visas. Of the total, 58% were from the United States, 30% were from Africa, and the remainder were from the Philippines, Europe, and beyond.

Altar Calls: A Little Background

The question has been raised to me more than once over the past several months of: Why don't we ever include an altar call in our Order of Worship, Pastor Kim?

In my own personal faith tradition, We have not regularly practiced the invitation of an altar call. But these questions from some FUMC faithful followers aroused my interest enough to do a little investigating...which is offered below:

According to Wikipedia, an altar call is a tradition in some evangelical Christian churches in which those who wish to make a new spiritual commitment to Jesus Christ are invited to come forward publicly. It is so named because the supplicants gather at the altar located at the front of the church building. In the Old Testament, an altar was where sacrifices were made. So, the name "altar call" refers to a believer offering themselves on an altar to God (Romans 12:1). Most altar calls occur at the end of an evangelical address. Congregations often sing a hymn, usually with a theme of invitation or decision, during the altar call.

Altar calls are a recent historic phenomenon beginning in the 1830's in America. Other early names for them were "the anxious seat" and "the mourner's bench." They cannot be found in the Bible, but are an attempt to adapt the call for repentance to particular cultural contexts, where such a public show of confession may find greater response.

Some churches object to the use of the altar call for a variety of reasons. They argue that the Bible does not

refer to any similar practice. Others believe it is intimidating and therefore creates an unnecessary and artificial barrier to those who would become Christians but are then unwilling to make an immediate public profession under the gaze of an assembly.

Other Christians object to altar calls in that they may mislead people into confusing outward conduct with spiritual change. In doing so, they argue, altar calls may actually give people false assurance about their salvation.

The United Methodist Book of Worship states that there should be a response to the Word in every worship service, and this "should include an invitation to Christian discipleship, followed by a hymn of invitation; or by a baptismal, confirmation, or reaffirmation hymn." The Book of Worship goes on to list what also may be part of the response to the Word, beginning with number one being "a first commitment to Christ, which may be followed, if appropriate, by enrollment in a preparatory group for baptism or confirmation." The United Methodist Book of Worship is clear-there needs to be a response to the Word in each service, but there are many ways to do this...and for many reasons. One such response is a sincere altar call that gives people a chance to pray at the altar as they make an offering of their lives to God as a sacrifice, or as they pray for others.
