NOTE FROM PASTOR PHIL THRAILKILL, U.M. RETIRED

Dear First Methodist,

The news is that I'm back in one piece and readjusting to life in the U.S. after a month teaching Luke in Nigeria. And when people ask, "How was it?" I say, "It was a world class Christian adventure. Bathing out of a bucket for a month brought back all my Boy Scout skills!" The first two weeks were in an isolated location in the east of the country, and the second two weeks in urbanized Lagos (destined – I am told – to be the most populous city in the world by 2050.)

There's no doubt that we are a fractured republic and at each other's throats about everything. But there's nothing like a month in Africa to restore one's perspective. A fifty mile trip here takes about an hour, not six and a half. You don't have to carry your own toilet paper. No group is raiding villages, stealing cattle, and killing Christians. And while we surely have some public corruption and graft, it's not a national sport. We here, as Christians in these United States, enjoy the choicest bounties of life, liberty, and – to paraphrase Jefferson – a call to live a holy and happy life. So love our great God, love your neighbor (the next person in front of you), and find ways to rebuild the social capital of friendship and community service. Many in Nigeria still see us as a light of hope and freedom. Perhaps they see something we have missed, maybe even forgotten.

I return blessed, stirred, chastened, and hopeful. I have invitations to return to both schools in 2020, and just today a formal invitation arrived to teach Luke in January in Liberia.

So thanks for your prayers. And thanks for your investment in the new thing God is doing in the midst of my seventh decade. July 5th was the 47th anniversary of my adult conversion, and it was appropriate I celebrated it in front of twenty-one graduate students, all of whom are pastors. I look forward to hearing from you and to encouraging one another to be both better and bolder for Jesus Christ. What a privilege to be loyal locally and engaged globally.
