Heal our wounded spirits, and cause us to serve you more faithfully. In the name of Jesus we pray, AMEN.

you thanks for your presence among us this day, through your Holy Spirit, that flickers like fire in the changing color of leaves, gleams like fish gliding below the surface of the stream, and flutters like doves in the beating of our hearts. And so, with all your people, all over the world, and all the company of heaven we praise your holy name and join their unending hymn:

Sing: Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Holy are you, and blessed is your Son Jesus Christ who emptied himself of divinity and walked among us teaching and healing and giving himself for the healing of the world. Reflections from the District Congregational Specialist...

Greetings in the matchless name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. It is once more and again that I have the privilege of addressing this august collection of God's people. This week's lectionary gospel reading is taken from Luke 16:19-31. It is a familiar parable about Lazarus and a rich man. Using the occasion of offering a greeting to this group as a hermeneutic frame, I have entitled this greeting, "Comfort on Command."

To set the context of the parable Jesus tells, it is worth noting that Jesus continues a string of teachings in Luke 16 that carries a common theme of turning conventional wisdom on its ear. This particular parable flies in the face of the common belief of the time that rich people were rich because of their righteousness before God. If you lived a life of comfort and ease, then it was expected that this comfort and ease would follow you into the afterlife. Likewise, Lazarus should expect the same evil and agony he experienced on earth to follow him into the afterlife. Not surprisingly, Jesus challenges this belief and causes his original audience to question what it means to be in right relationship with God and their fellow human beings. Jesus exposes the rich man's expectation for comfort on command. In Jesus' parable Lazarus is the righteous one and this is evident as Lazarus receives the reward of Abraham's embrace in the afterlife. Meanwhile, the rich man finds himself in the torment and agony of unquenchable flames. Even in the face of the evidence, the rich man still believes that he is calling the shots. He believes that he can have Lazarus commanded to come and provide him with comfort during his time of agony. The rich man seems to have forgotten that he built a gate to keep Lazarus away from him on earth and now that gate is a great chasm and the command on earth is honored in heaven. The rich man didn't want Lazarus around him on earth and so it is that Lazarus can't come to the rich man in the afterlife.

There is a great temptation to turn this parable into a time of gloating and rejoicing over the rich man getting what he deserved. However, to do so is to stand in direct opposition to the grace, mercy, and love of the gospel of Jesus Christ. I do not believe Jesus tells this parable so that rich people become villains and wealth becomes the source of all suffering. On the contrary, the scripture points out that Lazarus would have been happy with the crumbs that fell from the rich man's table. In other words, the rich man could have provided comfort on command for Lazarus. Even if he did not want to do so personally, he could have had his servants take something to Lazarus on a daily basis to alleviate some of his suffering. Moreover, this parable invites us to consider how God provides comfort and care in the midst of suffering and pain. Jesus tells his hearers that dogs came and licked Lazarus' wounds. There was no compassion to be found in the rich man who could see Lazarus at his gate everyday as he feasted, but God sent dogs to promote healing and provide some comfort to Lazarus. The rich man missed the opportunity to share God's blessings with Lazarus to further promote his healing and provide comfort. We are reminded that we are blessed to be a blessing and invited to heed the warning that the rich man fails to heed. We not only have Moses and the Prophets but we also have Jesus Christ, the One who has been sent to us from the dead. Jesus reminds us that Moses and the Prophets ought to be enough, so the addition of a resurrected savior leaves no room for any excuse. We are to live lives that reflect the generosity of the God we serve. We are to seek the welfare of all people. God calls us to live according to his love so that everyone has comfort on command.

Prayer: Gracious and loving God, we humbly ask your forgiveness for the times when we have been selfish and self-serving. Forgive us for the times we have set gates and fences to keep us from those we consider undesirable. Forgive us and renew our willingness to live in right relationship with you and all of your creation. Lead and guide us so that we follow your command to provide for those in need and to protect those without any other defense. This we pray in the name of your son, Jesus Christ. Amen.
